The intern will be a **valuable member of our reporting team**, contributing full articles and short news items to our weekly print paper and our website. You'll work closely with our staff and end the semester with a stack of professional clips.

C-VILLE is a 33-year-old alternative-weekly paper with a long history of reporting in central Virginia. We write about equity, development, city and state politics, climate, schools, local history, town-gown relations, food and drink, music, the arts, and more. Charlottesville is a historic city facing a complicated set of cultural and political problems as it grows—it might feel like a small town, but there's always something happening. The details: The position is **10 hours/week, paid at \$15/hour**, for roughly the duration of the spring semester. An ideal candidate will have some journalism experience, some knowledge of the area, and the ability to write with a strong and clear voice. Current college students and recent graduates are welcome to apply.
